
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INTRODUCTION

The Annual Overseas Trade Report for the calendar year 1985, retains the format of the previous years' Trade Report, except that some graphical presentation is included.


The figures published in this report have been fully revised and should be regarded as final.

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EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. SYSTEM OF TRADE CLASSIFICATION

The Standard International Trade Classification (Rev 2) issued by the Statistical Office of the United Nations as Statistical Papers Series M. No. 34/Rev. 2 of 1974, has been adopted in Dominica since 1981 January 01 with suitable modifications for the classification of all merchandise. The main sections of the SITC (R2) are:-

Section 0 - Food and Live Animals chiefly for food
1 - Beverages and Tobacco
2 - Crude Materials, Inedible, except fuel
3 - Mineral Fuels, Lubricants and related materials
4 - Animals and Vegetable Oils, Fats and Waxes
5 - Chemicals and Related Products, N.u.s.
6 - Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material
7 - Machinery and Transport Equipment
8 - Miscellaneous Manufactured Articles
9 - Commodities and Transactions not classified elsewhere in the S.I.T.C.

2. SYSTEM OF TRADE

The "SPECIAL TRADE" system has been used in the tabulations. That is, import figures include all goods cleared ex-warehouses for domestic consumption and they exclude all goods which remain in the custody of customs in bonded warehouses. Goods cleared ex-warehouses for exports have also been included. Thus, there is an appropriation to General Trade.

Exports are divided into exports of domestic produce and re-exports, shown separately. The latter are goods exported essentially in the same condition in which they are imported. Exports of domestic produce include previously imported goods which have been transformed by processing in this country.

Except in the case of goods cleared ex-warehouses, goods in transit through the State are not included in the trade figures.

3. QUANTITIES AND VALUES

Generally, all quantities and values have been based upon the declaration of importers and exporters on the customs documents which are subject to verification by customs officials.

All values are shown in East Caribbean Currency Dollars.

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C.I.F. Value is used in respect of all imports. This valuation is by definition "the price which an importer would give for the goods on a purchase in the open market, if the goods are delivered to him at the port of importation, freight, insurance, commission and all other costs, charges and expenses incidental to the purchase and delivery at that port (except any duties of customs) having been paid." (Sec 15 (2) (a) of Chapter 282 of the Laws of Dominica 1961)

F.O.B. Value is used in respect of exports. This is defined as the value at which goods were sold by the exporter, and includes all local charges to the exporting vessel or aircraft. Sea and Air freight, and marine and air insurance are not included and cash and trade discounts to the purchaser abroad are deducted. It includes local customs charges and other taxes in the State.

This F.O.B. Value is at best an estimate for the following reasons:-

- (a) Particulars of values of goods shipped on consignment are not available at the time of shipment. Reasonable estimates therefore, have had to be made until more reliable figures could be used.
- (b) There have been valuable exports of goods shipped from certain Subsidiary Companies to principals abroad. Since there is the possibility of undervaluation by those firms, the values used have been based on (1) World Market prices where available and (ii) Values of allied commodities exported.

Articles exported from the country for repair are not valued on exportation and only the cost of repairs (plus any other appropriate charges) are shown on re-importation.

4 DEFINITION OF COUNTRIES AND AREAS

The Statistics reported refer to the sovereign democratic republic of the Commonwealth of Dominica.

Imports are ascribed to the countries of origin of the goods. The Country of Origin is defined as the country in which the goods were wholly produced or manufactured, or the country in which any final operation altered, to any appreciable extent, the character, composition and value of partly manufactured goods imported into that country.

When the country of origin cannot be ascertained, the "country of consignment" is used, that is, the country from which the goods were despatched.

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Exports are ascribed to the countries of final destination, when known, or alternatively they are ascribed to the countries of last known destination. These are not necessarily the countries of final consumption.

The definition of countries and areas are as given in a draft countries list prepared by the United Nations Statistical Office (but see also special notes on geographical breakdown).

5. EXCLUSIONS

The following items have been excluded from the Trade Statistics:-

- (a) Ship's stores and bunkers supplied to locally registered craft.
- (b) Gold coin and bullion, issued coinage and issued bank notes.
- (c) Goods on lease such as cinematographic films.
- (d) Goods on loan such as samples for exhibition or study.
- (e) Gifts from UNICEF and similar organisations.
- (f) Parcel Post items of imports of less than \$5.00 strongly suspected as gifts.

6. PERIOD COVERED

The figures of imports and exports represent totals shown on all customs documents brought to account during the calendar year 1st January to 31st December 1985. These do not necessarily include only goods or all goods which arrived into or were shipped from this territory during the period. This definition although it may on occasions result in apparent discrepancies between the customs figures of imports and exports and figures obtained from other sources, must for various reasons be maintained.

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III. REVIEW OF THE YEAR'S TRADE

In 1985 various commodities valued at E.C.\$70.9 million were exported to over 27 countries, the principal ones being the United Kingdom (36.8 million); Jamaica (11.3 million); Trinidad & Tobago (3.2 million); Barbados (3.1 million); Guadeloupe/St. Martin (2.2 million); St Vincent and the Grenadines (2.2 million); and the United States of America (1.9 million).

Commodities valued at E.C.\$149.4 million were imported into Dominica, the principal sources being: The United States of America (36.6 million); the United Kingdom (24.9 million); Trinidad & Tobago (14.6 million); Japan (10.9 million); St. Lucia (8.9 million); Canada (7.1 million) and Guadeloupe/St. Martin (6.1 million).

The Balance of visible trade recorded a deficit of E.C.\$72.6 million; which is E.C. \$14.3 million or 16.5% less than that for 1984. However, there was an improvement in both the commodity and Income Terms of Trade during 1985.

EXPORTS

Bananas continued to be the main export commodity during 1985. Exports valued at E.C.\$35.9 million accounts for 50.7% of total domestic exports and 87.1% of total primary products exported. This represents an increase in value of E.C.\$5.9 million and quantity of 1,234 tonnes over that for 1984.

For manufactured products, the major exports were: Toilet Soap (10.8 million) 36.6%; Household Soap (EC\$8.4 million) 28.3%; Coconut Copra Oil Crude (EC\$1.9 million) 6.5%; Galvanised Sheets (EC\$1.10 million) 4.0%; Paints and Varnishes (EC\$1.14 million) 3.9% and Bay Oil (EC\$1.11 million) 3.8%.

In comparison to 1984, Figure 8 and Table 9 reveals that the share of primary products in total domestic exports increased while that of manufactured products decreased.

According to the S.I.T.C. Groups, the major exports were vegetables and fruits and essential oils and perfume' materials.

IMPORTS

The main imports during 1985 were machinery other than electric (EC\$15.1 million) 10.1%; transport equipment (EC\$12.8 million) 8.6%; metal and their manufactures (EC\$10.4 million) 7.0%; Other fuel oils (EC\$6.9 million) 4.6%; meat and meat preparations (EC\$6.5 million) 4.4%; cardboard boxes (EC\$7.5 million) 5.0%; gasolene (EC\$5.3 million) 3.7%; Flour (EC\$5.2 million) 3.5%;

Butter, milk, cheese (EC\$1.1 million) 2.8%; Manures (EC\$4.06 million) 2.7%; liquor (EC\$4.04 million) 2.7%; and wood and lumber (EC\$3.4 million) 2.3%.

Major food imports were cereals and cereal preparations; meat and meat preparations; dairy products and birds' eggs and miscellaneous edible products.

CARICOM TRADE

During 1985, trade with the O.E.C.S. group of countries appeared to be on the increase.

Exports to the OECS amounted to EC\$8.1 million, representing an increase of 12.6%, while imports valued at EC\$15.6 million represented an increase of 9.1% over that for 1984.

A deficit of EC\$7.1 million was recorded with this group of countries of total exports to the OECS. 26.7% was absorbed by St. Vincent & the Grenadines; 21.2% by Antigua; 21.8% by St. Lucia and 20% by Grenada/Carriacou.

Exports to the Rest of Caricom declined during 1985. Exports valued at EC\$19.3 million were EC\$3.8 million less than that for 1984. Imports however, were on the increase. Imports valued at EC\$21.4 million were EC\$2.9 million more than that for 1984.

Dominica's trade with its Caricom partners for the year 1985, showed that exports declined by 10% while imports increased by 13.1%. However, while in 1984 Caricom absorbed some 46.4% of total domestic exports in 1985 there was a decline in the market share to some 38.6%.

Whereas in the previous years (1983 & 1984) Dominica experienced a visible trade surplus with the rest of Caricom, in 1985 it experienced a visible trade deficit of EC\$0.8 million.



TOTAL TRADE & BALANCE OF VISIBLE TRADE









FIG. 3 COMMONWEALTH OF DOMINICA







TRADE WITH REST OF CARICOM (1985)






PERCENTAGE SHARE OF DOMESTIC EXPORTS & RE-EXPORTS

SHARE OF PRIMARY & MANUFACTURED PRODUCTS IN DOMESTIC EXPORTS




COMMONWEALTH OF DOMINICA CONTRIBUTION OF MAIN ITEMS TO DOMESTIC EXPORTS
