

INTRODUCTION

The Annual Overseas Trade Report for the Calendar year 1995 retains the format of the previous year's Trade Report.

The figures published in this report have been fully revised and should be regarded as final.

The Central Statistical Office adopts this medium to record its appreciation to the Comptroller of Customs and Staff for their cooperation in the collection of the data using the ASYCUDA Software, which was implemented in Dominica in January 1992. The office acknowledges also the efforts made by the staff of its own Trade Unit and Computer Section, in coding and checking the source documents, and computer processing of the data using EUROTRACE. EUROTRACE is a computer package implemented by the Central Statistical Office and the OECS Secretariat in January 1992 to process and tabulate trade data originating from ASYCUDA. The preparation of the summary tables was undertaken by Stephen Nicholas - STATISTICAL OFFICER II (Ag).

The various commercial houses, other organisations and individual businessmen are to be highly commended for their cooperation in answering queries brought to their attention.

Users are reminded that the data contained in this report have been derived from customs documents brought to account during the period under review. As a result, there may be discrepancies between the figures on Imports and Exports extracted from the Customs Declaration Forms and data obtained from other sources.

Notification of errors and/or suggestions for improvement of future reports will be appreciated.

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EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. SYSTEM OF TRADE CLASSIFICATION

The Standard International Trade Classification Rev.3 issued by the Statistical Office in the United Nations as Statistical Papers Series M. No. 34/Rev.3 1986 has been adopted in Dominica since January 01, 1992, with suitable modifications for the classification of all merchandise. Prior to this series M No.34/Rev.2 of 1974 was issued. The main sections of the S.I.T.C. (Rev.3) are:-

- Section 0 - Food and Live Animals chiefly for food
- 1 - Beverages and Tobacco
- 2 - Crude Materials, Inedible, except fuel
- 3 - Mineral Fuels, Lubricants and related materials
- 4 - Animals and Vegetables Oils, Fats and Waxes
- 5 - Chemicals and Related Products, N.E.S.
- 6 - Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material
- 7 - Machinery and Transport Equipment
- 8 - Miscellaneous Manufactured Articles
- 9 - Commodities and Transactions not classified elsewhere in the S.I.T.C.

2. SYSTEM OF TRADE

The "SPECIAL TRADE" system has been used in the tabulations. That is, imports figures include all goods cleared ex-warehouses for domestic consumption and they exclude all goods which remain in the custody of customs in bonded warehouses. Goods cleared ex-warehouses for exports have also been included. Thus, there is an appropriation to General Trade.

Exports are divided into exports of domestic produce and re-exports, shown separately. The latter are goods exported essentially in the same condition in which they are imported. Exports of domestic produce include previously imported goods which have been transformed by processing in this country.

Except in the case of goods cleared ex-warehouses, goods intransit through the State are not included in the trade figures.

3. QUANTITIES AND VALUES

Generally, all quantities and values have been based upon the declaration of importers and exporters on the customs documents which are subjected to verification by customs officials.

All values are shown in East Caribbean Currency Dollars.

C.I.F. Value is used in respect of all imports. This valuation is by definition the price which an importer would give for the goods on a purchase in the open market, if the goods are delivered to him at the port of importation, freight, insurance, commission and all other costs, charges and expenses incidental to the purchase and delivery at that port (except any duties of customs) having been paid.

F.O.B. Value is used in respect of exports. This is defined as the value at which goods were sold by the exporter, and includes all local charges to the exporting vessel or aircraft. Sea and air freight, and marine and air insurance are not included and cash and trade discounts to the purchaser abroad are deducted. It includes local customs charges and other taxes in the State.

This F.O.B. Value is at best an estimate for the following reasons:-

- (a) Particulars of values of goods shipped on consignment are not available at the time of shipment. Reasonable estimates therefore, have had to be made until more reliable figures could be used.
- (b) There have been valuable exports of goods shipped from certain Subsidiary Companies to principals abroad. Since there is the possibility of undervaluation by those firms, the values used have been based on (i) World Market prices where available and (ii) Value of allied commodities exported.

Articles exported from the country for repair are not valued on exportation and only the cost of repairs (plus any other appropriate charges) are shown on re-importation.

All quantities quoted in this report are in tonnes.

4. DEFINITION OF COUNTRIES AND AREAS

The Statistics reported refer to the sovereign democratic republic of the Commonwealth of Dominica.

Imports are ascribed to the countries of origin of the goods. The Country of origin is defined as the country in which the goods were wholly produced or manufactured, or the country in

which any final operation altered, to any appreciable extent, the character, composition and value of partly manufactured goods imported into the country.

When the country of origin cannot be ascertained, the "country of consignment" is used, that is, the country from which the goods were despatched.

Exports are ascribed to the countries of final destination, when known, or alternatively they are ascribed to the countries of last known destination. These are not necessarily the countries of final consumption.

The definition of countries and areas are as given in a draft countries list prepared by the United Nations Statistical Office (but see also special notes on geographical breakdown).

5. EXCLUSIONS

The following items have been excluded from the Trade Statistics:-

- (a) Ship's stores and bunkers supplied to locally registered craft.
- (b) Gold coin and bullion, issued coinage and issued bank notes.
- (c) Goods on lease such as cinematographic films.
- (d) Goods on loan such as samples for exhibition or study.
- (e) Gifts from UNICEF and similar organisations.
- (f) Parcel Post items of imports or less than \$5.00 strongly suspected as gifts.

6. PERIOD COVERED

The figures of imports and exports represent totals shown on all customs documents brought to account during the calendar year 1st January to 31st December, 1995. These do not necessarily include only goods or all goods, which arrived into or were shipped from this territory during the period. This definition although it may on occasions result in apparent discrepancies between the customs figures of imports and exports and figures obtained from other sources, must for various reasons be maintained.

9. SPECIAL NOTES ON GEOGRAPHICAL BREAKDOWN

For table 5, "O.E.C.S." comprises Antigua/Barbuda, Grenada, Monserrat, St. Kitts/Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent & the Grenadines, and Anguilla as an associated member.

"Rest of CARICOM" means Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Guyana, Jamaica, Suriname and Trinidad & Tobago.

"Other Caribbean Countries" means all Caribbean Island Territories except member states of O.E.C.S. and the Rest of CARICOM, which are listed above. Bermuda and the French, Dutch and American possessions in the Caribbean are all included.

"Asia" means the whole Asian Continent (bordering to Africa by the border between Egypt and Israel and to Europe by the border between Turkey on one side and Bulgaria and Greece on the other). Singapore, Hong Kong, Israel, Taiwan, Thailand, Korea/South, Indonesia, Papua, New Guinea, Cyprus and the Chinese Island of Hainan are included.

"Africa" means the African Continent (bordering to Asia by the Suez Canal but including all of Egypt). Island territories off the West Coast (Fernando Poo, Sao Tome, Cape Verde Islands, etc.) and the islands of East Africa (Madagascar, Mauritius, Reunion, the Seychelles, Comore Islands, etc.) are all included.

The "E.E.C." comprises the United Kingdom, Netherlands, France, Denmark, Belgium, Greece, Italy, The Federal Republic of Germany, Luxembourg, Portugal, Republic of Ireland and Spain.

"Europe (excluding E.E.C.)" means all other territories in continental Europe, except the part of Turkey to the West of the Bosphorus Strait. The whole of the U.S.S.R., Iceland, Malta, Crete, the Atlantic Portuguese possessions, Madeira, and the Azores, and the Spanish Atlantic possessions, the Canary Islands, are also included in this category.

"America" means North, Central and South America, and comprises Canada, U.S.A., Venezuela, Brazil, Colombia, Argentina, Mexico, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Suriname, Guatemala, Honduras and Panama.

"Ocean" means territories such as Australia and New Zealand and the Pacific Islands (Fiji, Tahiti, Samoa Island, the New Hebrides, New Caledonia and the U.S. Trust Territories.

REVIEW OF EXTERNAL TRADE: 1995

HIGHLIGHTS

During the calendar year 1995, total imports were valued at \$317.1 million, domestic exports at \$117.9 million and re-exports at \$4.2 million. During the year Dominica registered a deficit in the balance of visible trade which amounted to \$194.9 million.

Comparing 1995 with 1994, domestic exports decreased in 1995 by 1.0%, while total imports increased by 21.9%.

EXPORTS

Bananas continued to maintain its position as the major foreign exchange earner, accounting for 38.6% of total domestic exports. When compared with 1994, bananas registered a decrease of 19.8% in value terms and 25.5% in quantity.

Soaps remained the next major items exported, accounting for 34.0%. When compared with 1994, an increase of 20.0% was recorded. Other notable contributors to domestic exports were Paints, vanishes and lacquers (3.4%), Plantains (2.4%), Bay Oil (1.3%) and Pepper & Other Sauces (1.3%). Paints, varnishes and lacquers, Bay Oil and Pepper & Other Sauces showed increases of 70.5%, 30.1% and 35.4% respectively, while Plantains decreased by 6.1% when compared with 1994.

During 1995, Primary Products (i.e. mainly agricultural items) were valued at \$57.6 million. This figure represents 48.8% of total domestic exports, a decrease of 14.0% below the 1994 figure. On the other hand, Manufactured Products were valued at \$60.3 or 51.2% of total domestic exports, and recorded an increase of 15.7% over the 1994 figure.

For the first time in thirteen years, Manufactured Products have contributed more to domestic exports than Primary Products. This was as a result of the constant drop in banana earnings over the past three years, banana being the main primary product exported.

In 1995 domestic exports amounted to \$117.0 million or 96.5% of total exports and re-exports amounted to \$4.2 million or 3.5% of total exports. Comparing 1995 with 1994, domestic exports contribution to total exports showed a decrease of 1.1%, while re-export increased by 43.4%.

IMPORTS

According to the Sections of the Standard International Trade Classifications (S.I.T.C.) Rev.3, for the calendar year 1995, Machinery and Transport Equipments accounted for 24.1% of total imports, followed by manufactured goods classified chiefly by material (19.6%), Food and live animals chiefly for food (19.3%) and Chemicals and related Products N.E.S. (14.3%). A review of all these major sections showed increases of 41.9%, 18.7%, 16.6% and 23.2% respectively, when compared with 1994.

Looking at Principal items within the Sections of S.I.T.C. (Rev.3), Machinery other than electric dominated the total imported items accounting for 12.3% of total imports, an increase of 73.3% over the figure for 1994. Other notable imports were Metal and their products (7.2%), Machinery Electric (6.2%), Transport Equipment (5.6%) and Meat and Meat Preparation (4.1%).

When compared with 1994, Metal and Their Products and Machinery, electric showed increases of 67.4% and 10.7% respectively. On the other hand Transport equipment and Meat & Meat Preparations registered decreases of 11.1% and 8.9% in that order.

TRADE WITH CARICOM

During 1995 total trade with CARICOM countries amounted to \$137.1 million, of which imports accounted for \$84.9 million, domestic exports \$51.1 million and re-exports \$1.1 million. The total trade figure reflected an increase of 14.7% over the 1994 figure.

Domestic exports to CARICOM accounted for 43.3%, re-exports 26.4% and imports 26.8% of total trade. Comparing 1994 with 1995, domestic exports, re-exports and imports increased by 20.2%, 69.5% and 11.1% in that order.

The OECS absorbed some 35.7% of domestic exports and supplied 34.9% of imports, while the Rest of CARICOM absorbed 64.3% of those exports and supplied some 65.1% of imports.

St Lucia was the major trade partner in both domestic exports and imports, accounting for 14.1% and 18.9% respectively for the OECS. On the other hand for the Rest of CARICOM, Jamaica was the main market for domestic exports (i.e. 28.4%) while Trinidad and Tobago was the main supplier (i.e. 41.0%).

TRADING PARTNERS

The United Kingdom continued to rank as the number one domestic export market, accounting for 39.5%, a decrease of 19.6% below the 1994 figure. Other significant markets were Jamaica (12.3%), Guadeloupe/St Martin (6.3%), Guyana (6.3%) and St Lucia (6.1%).

The United States maintained its number one position as the main supplier of imported goods, accounting for 29.5%. This figure represents an increase of 16.4% over the 1994 figure. Other major Suppliers were the United Kingdom (13.5%), Trinidad & Tobago (11.0%), France (6.5%) and St Lucia (5.1%).

BALANCE OF TRADE

For the calender year 1995, Dominica's balance of visible trade showed a record high of \$194.9 million, and was a deficit. Compared with the 1994 figure an increase of 41.3% was recorded.




Total Trade and Balance of Visible Trade : 1985 - 1995

Percentage Domestic Exports to CARICOM Countries - 1995



Percentage Imports From CARICOM Countries - 1995




SHARE OF PRIMARY & MANUFACTURED PRODUCTS IN DOMESTIC EXPORTS: 1985 - 1995





Principle Trading Partners in Domestic Exports - 1995
